Death of Richard Golledge. Richard Golledge, an old pioneer, died at St. Joseph hospital on Mon-by evoning of heart disease. The de-ceased was aged 55 years and in early days was gold commissioner during, the Leech River excitement, and also private secretary to the late Governor Sir James Douglas. 



A PIONEER GONE.

Cariboo Jack Passes in His Checks at Port Townsend.

John E. Pugh, the well known pioneer of Puget Sound, died at the Central Hotel, Port Townsend, on Sunday eveninc, after a long illness. The deceased was born in Nova Scotia in 1835. At nineteen years the western fever caught hold of ".Jack," as he was familiarly called, and he started for California by way of Panama. On the same voyage was William Dodd of Port Townsend, who

was William Dodd of Port Townsend, who in latter years became Jack's business associate. For several years Mr. Pugh remained in California, mostly, however, ground the mines. In 1862 he left for the new gold discoveries in the Cariboo coun-try, British Columbia. In this region he became known as "Cariboo Jack." Re-maining there for two or three years, in which he accumulated considerable money, he went over to Puget Sound, and a few years later became manager of the Port Discovery Hotel, which business he has retained for the past twenty years. In 1872 he visited the scenes of his boy-hood days for a brief period. The follow-ing year he was married in San Francisco. The deceased leaves a widow and three children to mourn the loss of a devoted hubband and an affectionate father. They



PETROLEUM VS. COAL.

A majority of the forry steamers of the Southern Pacific road are now being alter-ed so as to burn petroleum for fuel in-stead of coal. The change being made has been found to be more economical and will not interfere with the present hotels on a smaller scale, now insufficient to ac-commodate the increasing travel. There are several places of accommodation at the upper hot springs—the sanitarium south of the Bow, and others in the town of Banff, north of the Bow and at the railway station. Their charges are mod-erate. Next season, therefore, all classes can be suited. Certain fishing tourists complain of scarcity of trout in the Bow, where formerly fishing was excellent. This suggests the necessity of having a fish hatchery established to re-stock Bow and Spray rivers and lakes in the Na-tional park, as well as other over-fished streams in Alberta. Such an es-tablishment would be an additional a attraction to visitors. There is a very suitable site which it might occupy, in a thickly wooded grove on the east side of the spring, which is now connected with the west by the new iron bridge recently placed over the river there. The new iron bridge across the Bow immedited and more convenient. The steamers Oakland and Julia as well as the freight transfer boats of the Thoroughfare & Transit com-pany all put in petroleum and the next one to be altered is the Solano, the huge Carquinez straits transfer boat. The price of petroleum when the experiment was first made was \$1.65 per barrel and on this a saving of 10 per cent. was made. The present price of petroleumis \$1.45, on besides this, however, the wear and tear on the boiler is diminished, the services of one of the two firemen are done away with and the risks of explosion or of ac-cident are minimized. The fuel is not burned directly, but is sprayed by means of a steam jet, this being the only possi-ble means of burning it. The Southern Pacific people are desirous of utilizing petroleum on those of their locomotives plying on the suburban trains in order to do away with smoke and other inconveniences.
